



BACKGROUND AND OVERVIEW

Cottesloe Surf Life Saving Club (CSLSC) is Western Australia's first surf life saving club. Club members have been patrolling and saving lives at Perth's most iconic beach since 1909.

Cottesloe Beach attracts over 600,000 visitors every year and 112 years on CSLSC continues to protect the many locals and visitors (both interstate and international).

Cottesloe Beach

CSLSC provide essential education and emergency services to all beach users.

The club also provides significant additional community support to a significant calendar of events held on the beach each year.

Cottesloe Beach is also the most popular setting for ocean based community events in Western Australia, which are all supported by CSLSC.

These popular community events include the Sculptures by the Sea, Rottnest Channel Swim, Cottesloe Classic Mile, Cottesloe Cup Water Polo Tournament, Ocean Water Swim Series, Cottesloe Film Festival, Cott to Swanny Classic, Cottesloe Crabs and Beatty Park Bears (community swimming groups), Park Run and the school leavers traditional last day swim.

Cottlesloe Beach is also a popular tourist destination with a range of attractions including the landscaped foreshore with the Norfolk Pines, the Indiana Tea House, an enclosed swimming net, hotels and a large number of bars and restaurants. This attracts a wide range of visitors from outside the Cottesloe area. The effect of this is a more densely populated beach and surrounding areas with swimmers of varying abilities, including many with limited ocean swimming experience. These factors mean that there is currently more demand for life saving services than other metropolitan beaches in Perth.

The proposed additional developments to the foreshore area including the Indiana Tea House development and other proposed hotels will further increase demand and CSLSC needs to increase their capability and capacity in order to meet this forecast demand.

Economic Benefit

The most recent cost benefit analysis of Surf Life Saving Western Australia (SLSWA) shows that for every \$1 invested into SLSWA a return of \$14.71 is expected in benefits to SLSWA members and the WA community. Australia wide this figure is \$20.20 achieved for the Australian community.

These significant returns on investment reflects the value of critical lifesaving duties performed by volunteers involved in surf lifesaving clubs both here in WA and across Australia.

In addition to this, research conducted by the Commonwealth Government estimates that each death that is avoided due to surf lifesaving intervention is valued at \$4.5 million.

Social Benefit

The primary benefit delivered by the club is the prevention of drowning and improved beach safety for the users of Cottesloe Beach.

There are several secondary benefits including the community engagement and personal satisfaction members derive from volunteering and the transferable skills gained from club participation that benefit the wider community (e.g. first aid training).

FUTURE GROWTH

A PLAN AROUND GROWTH

Cottesloe Beach precinct and surrounding areas have been experiencing significant population growth through urban renewal and infill over recent years. In addition there are several major projects either approved or proposed which will all significantly increase commercial, residential and visitor numbers to Cottesloe. These include the Cottesloe Foreshore Master Plan, the Indiana Tea House Redevelopment, the Community Skate Park, Seapines and the OBH redevelopment.

A balanced and focused Strategic Plan will ensure that CSLSC will grow and evolve in unison with these significant developments and will continue to be able to meet demand and serve the community. The Strategic Plan sets growth targets and is the guide to achieving financial and redevelopment deliverables so that CSLSC can continue to successfully operate into the future.

The Strategic Plan targets 2000 members by 2030, with a target of 700 Nippers and 430 Active members. This will ensure CSLSC can continue to provide the critical patrolling and lifesaving resources to our community of beach users now and in future years.

Whilst there are many competing needs within CSLSC without a fundamentally strong 'Active Bronze Medallion' member base the club will not be able to achieve its purpose. The 'Active Bronze Medallion' members are the engine room of CSLSC and the ongoing recruitment and training of new candidates is critical to the clubs wellbeing.

The Strategic Plan identifies the key requirements for each of the club's four pillars (Life Saving, Education, Surf Sports and Youth) and is supported by the operational requirements of sustainable operations, financial viability and club culture and relationships.

UPGRADES

In March 2018 CSLSC published a refurbishment business plan identifying the need to significantly upgrade and improve its facilities in order to achieve the club's visions and initiatives.

The existing clubhouse and facilities at 87 Marine Parade are outdated and dysfunctional and do not adequately support members and the broader communities needs and expectations.

The replacement or upgrade of the current clubhouse continues to form part of the future strategy of the club and will facilitate elements of this strategic plan which are noted within the document.

Measuring Success: Delivering Services

To assess the CSLSC's achievement of strategic outcomes, the following performance indicators provide a basis for evaluation.



PILLAR 1 - LIFESAVING

The proposed developments on the Cottlesloe foreshore and the wider Cottlesloe community are going to increase demand on CSLSC to provide additional beach patrol, life saving services and community event support. The club needs to ensure that there are sufficient numbers of volunteers who are adequately trained and resourced to meet both current and future demands of the beach.
